RIGHT TO WORK NOT To WORK For Anguilla roads

IN EVERY democratic society every ablebodied man and woman has the right to obtain employment with a reasonable remuneration for work done. Along with this right to work is involved the right to withhold labour. This freedom to stop work so as to bring pressure upon employers is well-known and accepted especially in the West Indies where most Governments attained power by virtue of trade union organization and by utilising the weapon of the strike.

Over the past few days we have seen an develop in St. Kitts where industrial situation develop in St. Kitts where the Waterfront Airport and Manual Workers Union (W A.M.) has demanded from A.M. Losada Limited the reinstatement of four workers who claimed to have been dismissed without cause. There have also been demands for a more reasonable salary. Negotiations appear to have broken down and the stage was set for an industrial power struggle.

One would have expected that the Government would keep out of this struggle and if anything, assume the role of an impartial referee. Instead we heard Southwill, the Deputy Premier of this State, immediately threatening to break any sympathy strikes at the Waterfront and former Assistant Community with effect from 2 September. Dulcie Richardson (for An-Government behind Capital in this struggle in a determined attempt to crush the workers. For a Government which labels itself Labour, this is unpardonable behaviour.






