Having got Britain to invade Anguilla by which act she initially suffered severe ridicule and embarrassment, he now seeks in vain to get her out; but this is the St. Kitts Government's turn to reap its well-deserved share of humiliation to the delight of the Anguillans who have virtually won their struggle for free. dom.

It is a severe indictment against the St. Kitts Government that Anguilla prefers to be reverted to Crown Colony status for it shows a sickening lack of confidence in Bradshaw's administration. Burnham and all West Indian Heads of Government must realise that political failure on the part of St. Kitts resulted in the Anguilla situation and that the Anguillans were forced to plot their own path through the wilderness of economic and political arrest to recognition. These Governments had never thought of aiding Anguilla, and when the crisis developed they did not even advise Bradshaw to agree to the peace proposals offered by the Opposition Party in St. Kitts. They should not now try to hinder the island's progress.

We feel that the Anguillans like other people are the masters of their own destiny and consequently should be given a free choice. 


