# ANGUILLA And WHITLOCK

A NGUILLA HAS once more been catapulted into the limelight of the world news and has been the topic of discussion for the past few days. We prefer not to pass any value judgment upon Whitlock's visit to Anguilla until we are in possession of the facts from both sides. What is most obvious is that the "Mafia" issue is a figment of Bradshaw's imagination and has no facts to support it and seemingly responsible people should not continue to spread falsehoods to justify the attitude of the St. Kitts Government. 
