## Government Must Insure

IT IS WITH some shock that we learned that Government vehicles in this State are not insured save for the C.H.A. vehicles. This is especially so when one realises the high incidence of recent accidents involving Government vehicles. The Army jeep C.N. 1635 has alone had the impressive record of some four major accidents in the Basseterre area. The Electricity Department jeep has had a complete overturn. The Police Land Rover has collided with a Van only this past week.

The idea of third party insurance is to protect innocent persons who may be the unwilling victims of people who tend to drive at excessive speeds. It is ridiculous to have the fire vehicles uninsured because of the very nature of their work; there is considerable risk for the general public. Every day one can see the Army and Police vehicles dashing along our roads to the grave danger of life and limb.

Surely one should not have to be approaching Ministers of Government for compensation in cases of accidents. There should be adequate insurance of all vehicles.

It is time that the people of the State recognise that no body of persons is above the law. The members of Government are human and make mistakes. The Army and Police in an excess of enthusiasm may cause incidents which perhaps they did not envisage. We call upon the Government to deal with this matter immediately and to protect the public by Insurance.

## WEBSTER: "We are determined"

Anguilla-born the Rev. C. Leonard Carty, Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Br. Honduras, has joined the Anguilla delegation to the London Talks on the Anguilla situation which opened on Monday, October 14.

The Anguilla delegation therefore comprises the Chief Executive of Anguilla Mr. Ronald Webster, the Rev. C. L. Carty, and their legal adviser Mr. Carl Hudson-Phillips of Trinidad and Tobago.

The St. Kitts delegation consists of the Premier of St. Kitts Nevis Anguilla, Mr. R. L. Bradshaw, the Attorney General and Minister of Jus-

tice, Mr. Eugene Walwyn and the Public Relations Officer to the Premier Mr. Lee Moore.

Interviewed by Mr. Alva Clarke over 'London Calling the Caribbean' on Thursday, Mr. Webster said that they were determined to hold their point.

Asked if he thought there was a possibility of an honourable settlement, Mr. Webster said it was rather difficult at this stage but "as I told you we are determined."

He said that the people of Anguilla are 100 per cent behind their leaders at the moment, and they are in favour of the secession.

Rev. Carty said they held a very successful meeting at Slough on Sunday afternoon with about 300 Anguillians present. He added that the meeting was very enthusiastic but the delegation was able to keep the political fever down to the lowest possible degree.

Rev. Carty also got the impression that the Anguillians in Slough were 100 per cent behind them.

## Pays 10-day visit

Mr. Franklin G. Musgrave, son of Mr. F. W. Musgrave of New Town, Basseterre, arrived in St. Kitts last week Wednesday from Montreal, Canada where he has been studying at St. George Williams University for the past four years.

He has passed his B.A. in Psychology, fulfilling medical requirements, and next September hopes to enter the medical school where he will continue his studies for another four years.

Mr. Musgrave taught as a pupil teacher at Basseterre Boys' School and afterwards worked at the former Cunningham Hospital for almost five years. While there he studied dispensing and qualified as a chemist and druggist.

He returned to Canada yesterday.

## Kittitian for Anglican Ministry

Mr. William Lake, Kittitian, a teacher at St. Peter's Primary School left here last Saturday for Codrington College, where he will study for Anglican Holy Orders.

There he will meet Mr. Winston Isaac, another Kittitian who is entering his third year.

Mr. Lake was a choir member and Sunday School teacher at St. George's, Basseterre.

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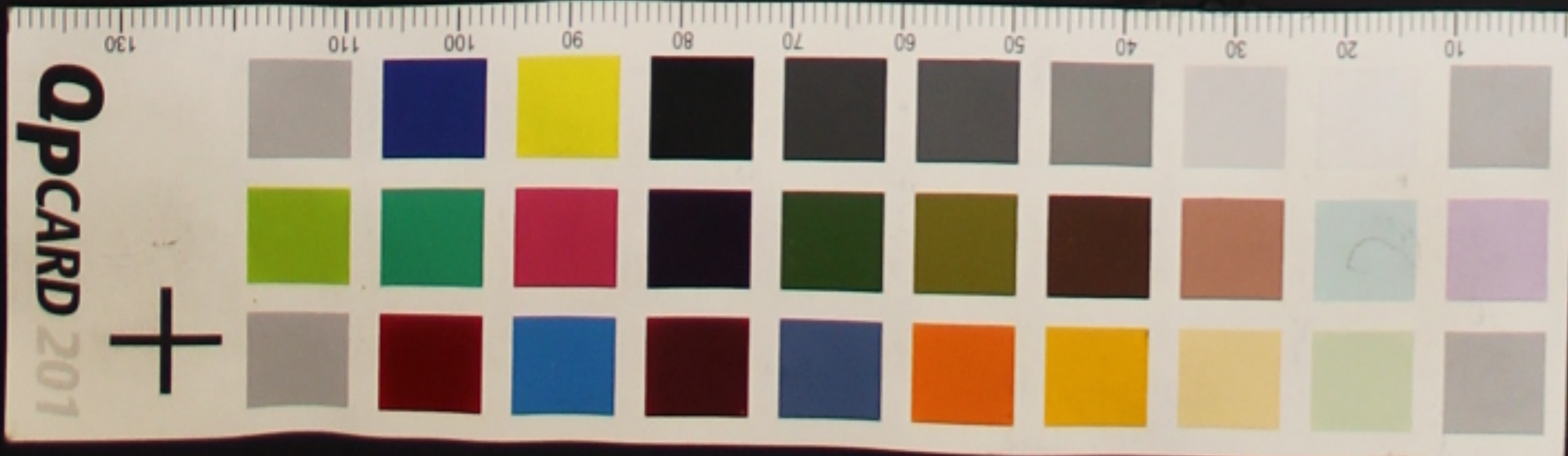
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# The Tearing Conflict between Duty and Conscience

Pontius Pilate knew what it was like. The mob shouted for Christ's crucifixion and wilyly perverted the course of justice. "Thou art not Caesar's friend if thou let this man go," they told him. "We have a law and by that law, he ought to die." As judge of the law, Pilate had to execute his duties in accordance with the law and as Caesar's friend, he could not displease him. He knew the charges against Christ were malicious and destructive, but he loved pomp and vain glory and couldn't lose the honour that was his. Having stifled his conscience, he delivered up Christ to be crucified and fell a victim of the tearing conflict between duty and conscience.

Earlier this week, another man whose mental attitudes are unpredictable, has been and is still being experiencing a similar conflict. The man, Eugene Walwyn, was chosen by Premier Bradshaw to be one of the delegates at the London talks concerning Anguilla's secession.

As a wily benchman of

the Bradshaw regime and Attorney General of the State, it is indeed expected that Eugene will try to play his part well; but in this Anguilla affair, I believe another man would have had second thoughts and tried to avoid being involved as much as possible. This is fundamentally so when Eugene Walwyn some years ago, was himself a secessionist advocate, and as leader of the United National Movement, he went to London to discuss secession for Nevis! He respected and upheld the democratic right to self-determination and saw nothing wrong about the people of Nevis aspiring for it. Another interesting thing is that the same man with whom he has now gone to condemn and vilify the Anguillans, was the same man he despised, quarrelled with and demonstrated against over Nevis.

One wonders whether this former advocate of secession will sit comfortably in his seat around the Conference table while these thoughts torment him. Will he respond to the call of his conscience: "Eugene Walwyn! what doest

thou here? Will he not blush at the sight of Ronald Webster?

Like everybody else, he knows that the people of Anguilla have a right to self-determination and that the charges against them especially the one that racism is responsible for their bid secession, is downright misleading and at that, is an unpardonable and callous lie. He knows the truth about Anguilla's stand, yet one can almost hear him speaking above his conscience in condemnation of the 6,000 Anguillans. But can he do otherwise? I think not for he must guard against losing his honour and position and listen to the stooges whose voices in imagination are saying, "If you don't join in and condemn the Anguillans, you are not Bradshaw's friend."

Surely, although Eugene Walwyn will play his part well to his friend's delight, he cannot really ignore the voice of his conscience. One wonders whether it did not begin bothering him while he was in St. Kitts hence his absence from the rostrum of Warner Park two days before he was scheduled to leave for London.

Like Pilate he may yet have to wash his hands for his part in an affair which may sooner or later become too damnable for his conscience.

## WAGES OUTLOOK in the SUGAR INDUSTRY

The importance of the sugar industry to the economic life of St. Kitts is so vital that the Sugar Association feels bound to place the following facts before the public. The industry is facing a very serious financial situation — so serious as to threaten its continual operation as a business enterprise. The main cause has been that the island has experienced six years of continued drought and the sugar crop has therefore continued to grow less and less.

Even in 1966 the industry found itself in no position to bear the cost of any wage increase but the Union pressed for higher wages. In order to effect a temporary compromise the Association agreed to use the Stabilization Fund to provide increases of 4% in 1966, 1% more in 1967 and 1% more in 1968, on the understanding that the industry itself would assume the burden of continuing to pay wages at this increased level from 1969. At the time it was hoped that the annual droughts, which had already reduced production to an uneconomic level, would give place to years of normal rainfall and that the industry would be able in the interval to recuperate sufficiently to meet this obligation which it undertook in all good faith.

But the droughts have continued unremittingly and have even become more severe. The 1968 crop is the smallest for twenty years, and there is little prospect of anything better in 1969. Indeed the outlook is worse. Several estates are now in a financially critical position. They have been losing money year after year and there is serious doubt as to whether they can continue in business. Certainly the industry is in no position to pay this wage increase.

Additional labour costs have been imposed upon the industry by legislation. Under the National Provident Fund Act the employers are obliged to pay contributions equivalent to 5% of all wages, though the assistance which the sugar industry will receive from the Stabilization Fund up to June, 1970, will reduce this burden to approximately 2%. The full burden will have to be borne by the industry after the expiration of that period.

The Holidays with Pay Act, 1968, has added further costs both by widening the category of workers who become entitled and by changing the method of computing holiday pay. The qualifying period has been reduced to 26 days, and all persons who have worked for not less than 26 and not more than 126 days are entitled to receive holiday pay equivalent to one-ninth of their wages, i.e. over 11%. It is not yet possible

Rabid extremists see colour; it's a good thing I am colour blind. These extremists act on impulse and cannot countenance anyone who questions their motives.

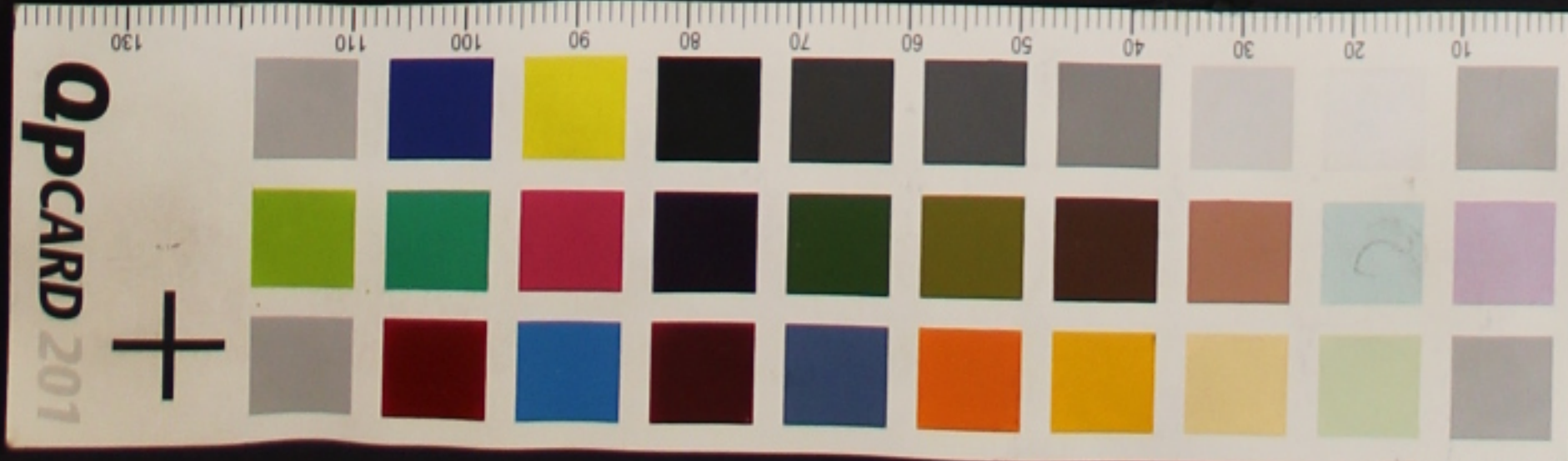
We can be grateful for our responsible young people who can carefully weigh issues and debate them before committing themselves. We can be thankful there are those who do not follow blindly the self proclaimed do-gooders without looking at their records. The rational men and women of today now know the difference between constructive criticism and down to earth demagoguery, meaningful inquiry and wilful underhandedness, between liberty and licences.

I do not think any right

thinking person wants to leave the principles of proven lawful liberty and democratic freedom for chaotic disorder. Some people are so concerned with the conduct of a small segment of our society, that they forget the high ideals, worthy aspirations, and the overwhelming achievements of many of our people. No doubt it is because of this injustice, why many people find it so hard to communicate with these people, on whom the heavy burden of responsibility rests. If generations yet unborn are to enjoy the freedoms which are worth dying for, people of all races, ages, all stations of life must face these realities.

The inalienable axiom of any people regardless of how rich, great, or strong, is that they cannot survive when they are rent asunder by internal discord and petty strivings. and friendly hearts will still be with their friends and families here in St. Kitts.

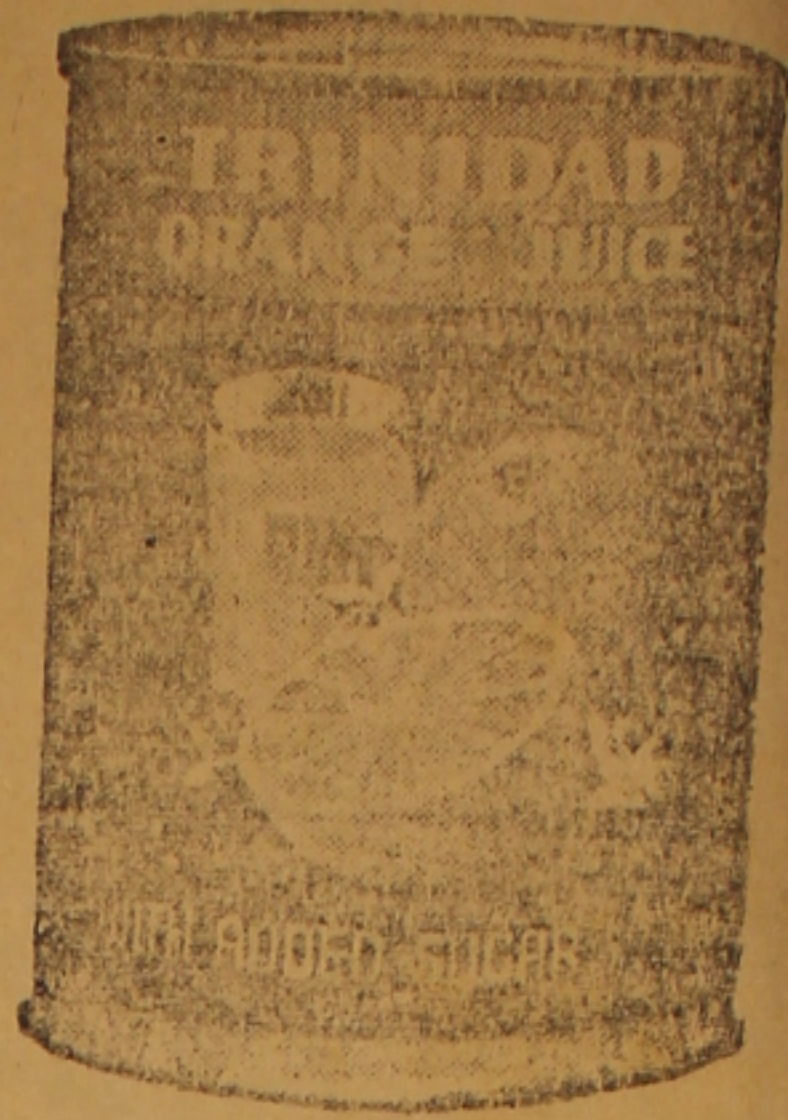

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have a good hope for deliverance, and quite possibly set a precedent for the rest of the world, for "The Lord has never yet failed those who trust Him". He said, "They

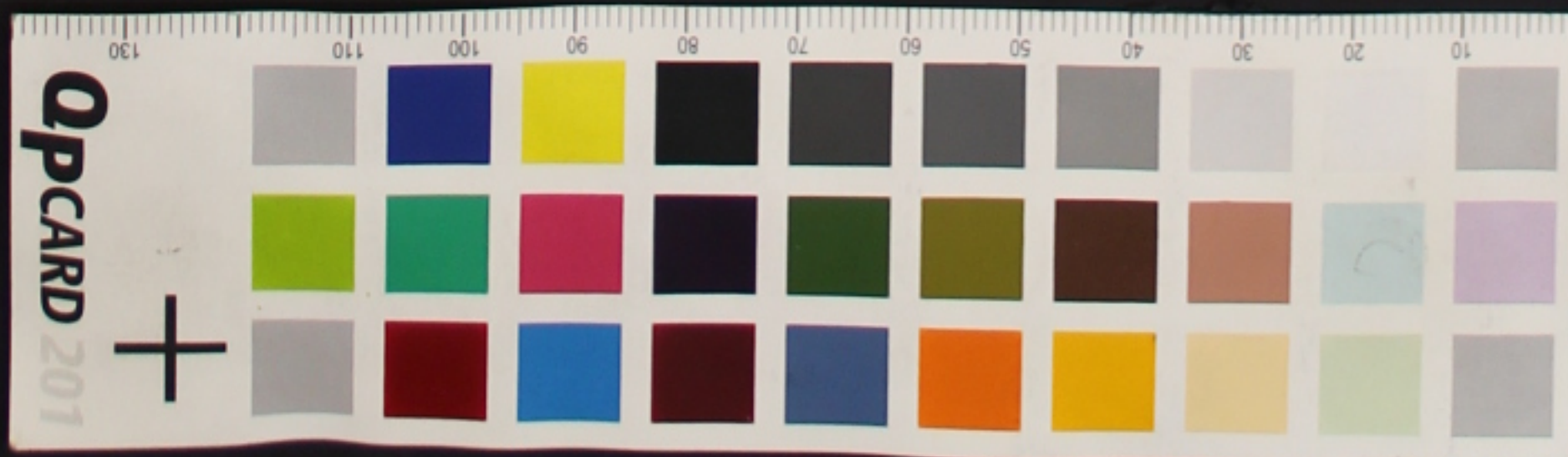

**Passport Case**

When the case of Evangeline James came up for hearing last week Thursday, her defence counsel Dr. W. V. Herbert requested the Judge Mr. Justice Glasgow, to quash the indictment which he claimed was not clearly worded. And the Director of Public Prosecutions Mr. H. M. Squires thereupon asked for permission to make an amendment to the said indictment.

The Judge considered the matter overnight and next morning (Friday) disallowed both requests, and hearing of the case proceeded.

According to the D. P. P., Evangeline James, mother of some eight children, on March 20 this year had falsely secured a passport by making application for the said passport in the name of her sister Margaret Charles. She intended emigrating to one of the U.S. Virgin Islands. She pleaded not guilty.

Mrs. Evangeline James's mother gave evidence on behalf of the Prosecution, and afterwards

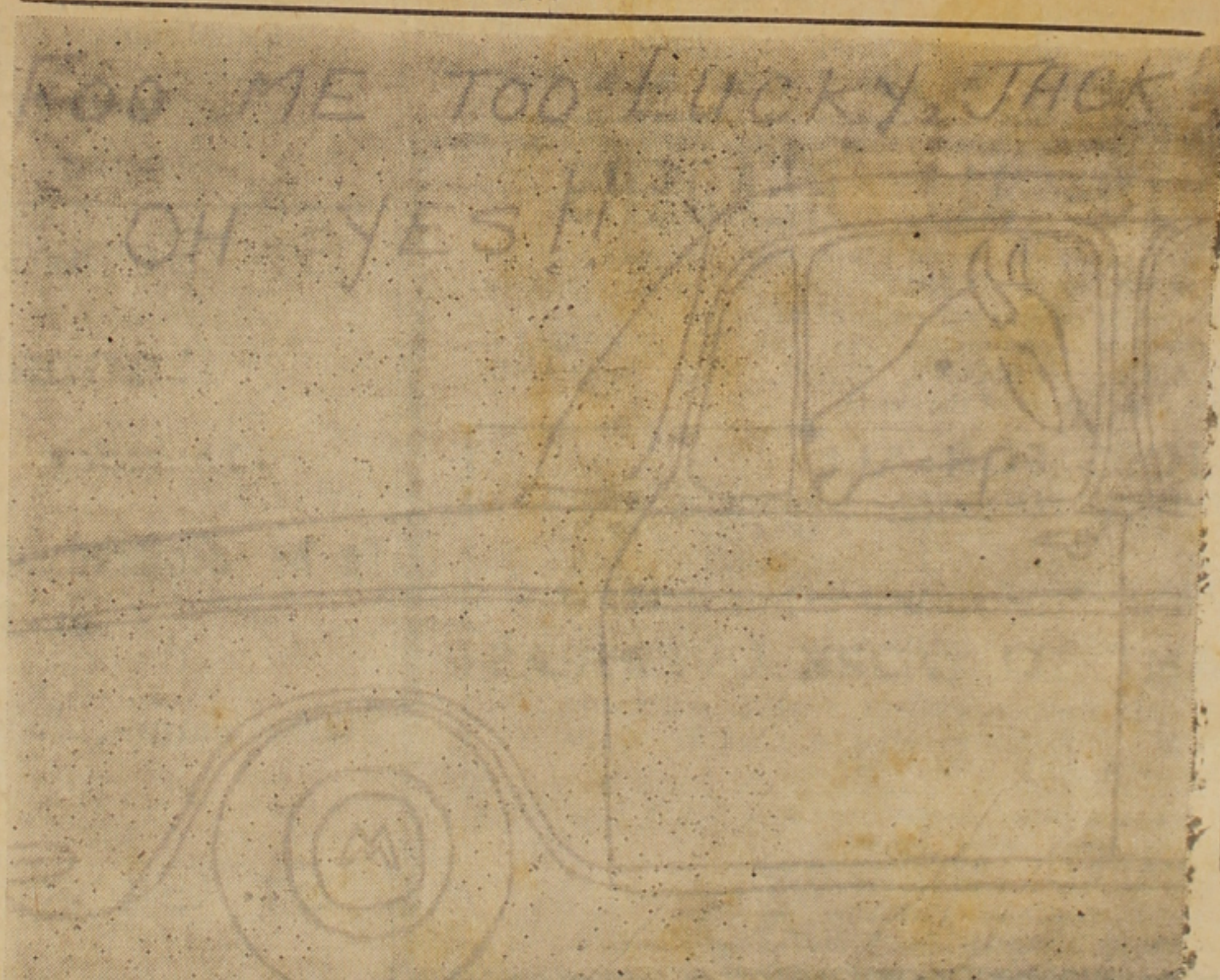

## EDITORIAL

Mr. Bradshaw made an announcement recently in Jamaica, that there is an outside possibility of Anguilla rejoining St. Kitts-Nevis. He also said that Britain is trying hard to get the reunion. This is interesting for two reasons.

At the meeting of the House of Assembly on May 29, he boasted that he would bring the Anguillan revolution to an end before the end of the year. He now only hopes for it as an outside possibility. It is true that a year ago Britain was also determined to bring Anguilla back to the fold, but much water has passed under the bridges since then, and we are sure that Britain is not so confident that this is possible, nor that it is a real solution of the problem.

We hear in Anguilla know that the interim period was designed to try and reconcile both sides, but we will never let an outside power dictate to us where we all belong. This was tried at the Barbados Conference, and it failed. Britain may still want to see a reconciliation, but she never will order Anguilla back to the fold. Those days are long past. This time the Anguillans will decide where to go. We have already decided where we are not going. Britain, whether she likes it or not, is already involved in the situation, and she as a founder of Democracy, knows that the rights of the people should be respected, and should tell Mr. Bradshaw so. If these talks with Britain should fail, Britain must intervene. By no means can she pull out and allow this confusion to continue. When France pulled out of Viet-Nam and allowed their problems to continue, things got worse, and soon the U.S.A. had to intervene. Now things are so hot there that they can not be handled without someone being

burnt every day.

Bradshaw feels that his hopes lie with Britain. For different reason, perhaps, we do too. But our strongest hopes are based on our determination to be masters of our own destiny. We do not depend on anyone to help us to remain free. The people of Anguilla have spoken, and their council will obey. We have no longer any fear that Britain will tell us that we must return to St. Kitts. If she takes that attitude she would be the latest papa doc.

Those of us who were fortunate to be present at the Wall Blake Airport, and saw Mr. Webster saying goodbye to his immediate family, and the members of the Government, and then to the general public, and then step into the Valley Air Service plane, and finally saw the plane disappearing to the South, will perhaps remember the famous words of Churchill. "If this is not the beginning of the end, it is at least the end of the beginning."

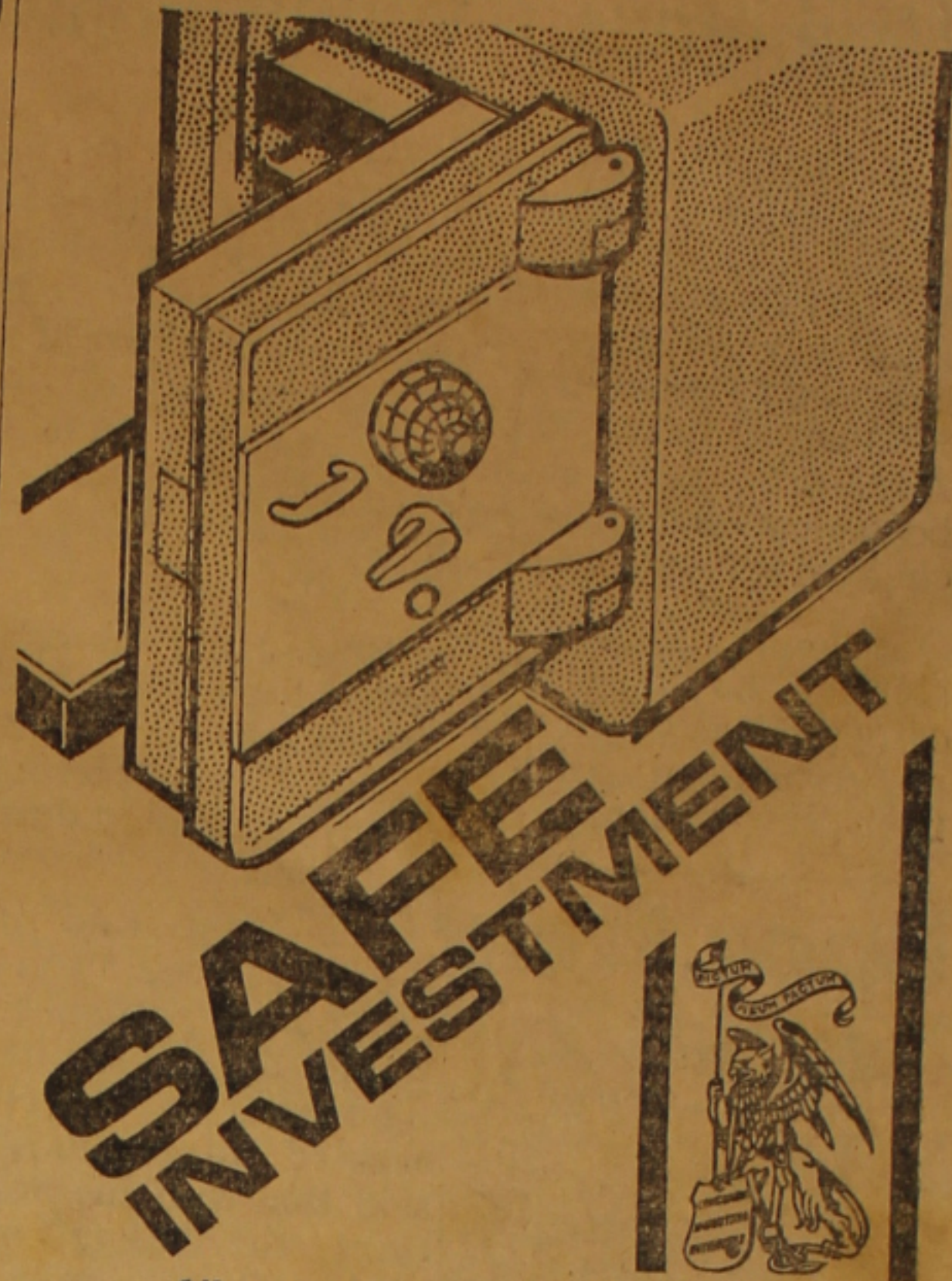
London Conference, due to begin on Monday October 14. On arrival Mr. Phillips was met by Mr Webster and other members of the Council. He then had informal talks with members of the Council, and later attended a public meeting in the Park, so that he could get his impressions of the views of the people. Though this meeting was called at very short notice, word managed to get round, and there was a crowd of over 500 people to greet Mr. Phillips.

He said that he was a politician and a lawyer in Trinidad, but had come to Anguilla in the latter capacity. He went on to say that he had come to get the views of the people, because, as they say in Trinidad, "The voice of the people is the voice of God", and promised to do whatever he was instructed to do to the best of his ability. There were a few more brief words from other members of the community, and the crowd showed what their voice was in no uncertain manner.

Mr. Phillips is a member of the Government in Trinidad, and is one of the lawyers who defended Mr. Todville Harrigan in the famous conspiracy trials last November in St. Kitts. There Mr. Harrigan, and six others including Dr. Herbert were acquitted. At that time Mr. Phillips and Mr. Bernard St. John (a lawyer from Barbados) who also defended, visited Anguilla briefly, and met Mr. Webster and other members of the Government. Mr. Phillips preceded Mr. Webster, and left Anguilla on Tuesday 8, for London.

In his speech in the park on Monday, Mr. Webster appealed to all Anguillans to be quiet and orderly while he was away. He said that family quarrels are bound to arise, but asked them to hold hands in unity for the last long pull. Mr. Webster had the com-

plete backing of the Council for him to negotiate within his terms of reference. He asked the Council to choose three of their number to be in charge of the island

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
