Union Threatens Action It Workers Disciplined

(AP)-Roy Gottlieb, Executive Director of the Virgin Islands Labor Union, says in a letter to the Commissioner of Public Works that if any of the 25 Public Works employees who have stayed off their job to protest the transfer of an office manager are suspended or dismissed "the full weight of our organization will be brought to bear in their behalf."

Gottlieb told The Associated the Acting Governor is sworn to uphold." Acting Governor Cyril E. King originally ordered the transfer of Public Works Business office manager William Farrington "in the interest of enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of the department."

Employees of the office marched on Government House, with a petition calling for Farrington's return, and have since remained away from work. In a letter to the protesting employees over the signature of the department commissioner, the 25 were ordered to be back on their jobs today or

face "disciplinary consequences," The union claims that King violated the law because the transfer of Farrington is a demotion. Virgin Islands law requires that in the event action is taken to demote a government employee, charges must be preferred. This was not done in this case.

BRITAIN DENIES ANGUILLA CHARGE

LONDON AP) - The British government has denied a charge by Anguillan leader Ronald Webster that it went back on an agreement made between Webster and Britain's Lord Caradon.

Speaking in Puerto Rico on his way to New York, Webster said the new British Commissioner on Anguilla, Anthony Lee, had dissolved a seven-man council and declared martial

The Foreign Office in London said yesterday nothing has been done that did not adhere to the plans worked out by Webster and Lord Caradon. The seven-man council of islanders had been dissolved by Lee, but under the new agreement all of the council members were re-instated.

The Foreign Office also denied that British Army Engineers on Anguilla were occupation troops.

It said the men are making improvements on the island and training islanders to take over after they leave.

Webster is expected to work out the problems at meetings with Lord Caradon in New York this week.
