VALLEY AIR SERVICE OFFERS MORE

In order to help in the rush of Anguillans coming home for Christmas Valley Air Service (V.A.S.) has put on the run an eight seater "Grand Commander"

The Airplane is being leased by Valley Air Service from a firm in Alabama, U.S.A.

The 'Grand Commander' was flown out from Alabama to Capt, Lloyd of V.A.S. and arrived in Anguilla yesterday.

At present the aircraft is "Executive type" set up but will be remodeled to seat 12 passengers, says Capt, Lloyd.

The "Grand Commander" which is Turbo Charged propelled has a range of 1200 miles and a speed of 190 m.p.h. Both pilots from Valley Air Service, Clayton Lloyd and Michael Hughes (Mike) have been 'Checked out' in the Grand Commander.

Mike Hughes got acquainted with the same 'Commander' when he flew his five seater Piper Aztec up to Alabama about 6 weeks ago to have new engines installed

With the addition of the 'Commander' V.A.S. now offer a total of 20 seats to passengers, At present V.A.S. runs a scheduled service from Anguil between the Canary Islands and la, St. Thomas and St. Marten.

RADIO ANGUILLA OFFERS GALAXY OF CAROLS AND SPECIAL FEATURES OVER THE CHRISTMAS SEASON:

Nearly two dozen specially arranged Christmas programmes will be broadcast over Radio Anguilla during the week of Christmas celebrations in Anguilla.

Her Majesty the Queen's voice will lead the list of messages for the people of Anguilla, and also will be heard are Christmas messages from H.M. Commissioner, Mr. W.B. Thompson and Mr. Ronald Webster. These messages will be broadcast at 11.00 a.m. Christmas day and repeated that evening at 7.15 p.m.

For Anguilla listeners the BBC has recorded special messages from Anguillans residing in Slough Bunks, England, and these may be heard at 8.30 p.m. 24th December, repeated at 10.00 a.m. Christmas Day. The programme is "Greetings from Slough".

A new feature this year is "Christmas in Anguilla" produced by Menes Hodge who has been visiting most parts of the island recording messages from Anguillans to friends and relatives on the island and abroad. This will be broadcast at 7.30 s.m. on Christmas Day, and repeated at 5.00 p.m. on 26th Dec.

Mondreds of Anguillans are returning to the island for Christmas, Many of their voices in Christmas messages will be heard on the programme "Visitors' Album" being recorded by Ralph Hodge, at 6.15p.m. on 23rd. December and repeated at 1.30 p.m. 26th December.

Other special programmes include the complete recording of Handel's "The Messiah" during the "Symphony Hour" on Radio Anguilla at 3.00 p.m. 20 December, repeated at 8.30 p.m. that evening.

The following Sunday the "Symphony Hour" will feature 'Beethoven's "Choral" Symphony'.

It is hoped that a programme of

"Caribbean Carols" featuring the Blue Diamond Steel-Band and the A.P.U. Quartet can be heard at 6.15 on Christmas night, repeated at 2.00 p.m. 27th December.

WOODING COMMISSION'S REPORT: (Cont'd from Last Week)

10/ Boxing Day

69 On July 3rd, the Premier again broadcast an invitation to the people of Anguilla to stand by the understanding reached with their representatives, but without response from Anguilla. Later the Deputy Premier broadcast a proposal to meet the Anguillans on neutral ground for another round of talks. St. Martin was proposed, but the meeting did not materialise, we were told, mainly because the authorities in St. Martin felt that it might embarrass them.

First Referendum - first declaration of independence.

70. On 11 July, 1967, a referendum was held in Anguilla. The 1966 Electoral List was used and voters were asked to answer "yes" or "no" to two questions:
"(1) Are you in favour of Secession

from St. Kitts?
(2) Are you in favour of settin

(2) Are you in favour of setting up the interim Government?

A proclamation issued on 7 July explained the meaning and intent of these two questions. The purpose of the second, and Mr. Emile Gumbs' evidence so confirmed, was to enquire whether the voters were in favour of the Peace-Keeping Committee continuing as an interim Government (Cont'd on page 7)

CIVIL SERVANTS INCREASE: (Cont'd from page 1)

Thas announcement was made by H.M. Commissioner yesterday in a letter to all Civil Servants

The letter said that the Civil Servants will receive an increase of about 30% of their present salaries and will be back dated to January 1st. 1970.

It is understood that the increase is based on the "Wand Tetley Report" for St, Kitts and Nevis,

To meet the cost of the increase a special grant will be made to Anguilla by H.M. Government,

It is understood that the "Anguilla Teachers & Civil Service Assocaition" met last night to discuss the way the increase has been made.

H.M. Commissioner in a letter to all Civil Serwants said:

"Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom have agreed to provide the money for a salaries increase readers from the management and sufficient to make sure that civil servants in Anguilla do not remain behind the current level of salaries in this part of the world. To this end an increase of about 30% backdated to 1 January 1970 will be calculated and paid out as soon as possible. Unfortunately the amount of clerical work concerned and the need to await the arrival of sufficient money from the United Kingdom means that payment cannot be made before Christmas. Arrangemants are being put in hand to adjust the salaries during January and to make the necessary payment to all concerned.

When the future of Anguilla has

been finally determined it will be necessary to re-examine the structure of the civil service and, no doubt, to establish a commission for this purpose. It should be clearly understood that the present increase will take the form of a direct grant to cover the interim period.

I am sorry you could not have the extra money in your pockets for Christmas but at least this little notice should cheer you up for Christmas.

To both questions, 1,813 voters said "yes" and 5 "no"

Telegrams were sent to several reporters and countries, including the United Kingdom, United States of America and the Commonwealth countries, as well as to the United Nations The Telegram read:

"Overwhelming referendum confirms absolute and final independence of Anguilla from the Federation of St. Kitts, Nevis, Anguilla, This leaves no legal ties with Crown, We wish to explore status of Associated State or other arrangement of freedom and local autonomy within the Commonwealth."

72. In this way, Anguilla had its UDI. Dr. Roger Fisher, a professor of International Law at Harvard University who is specially interested in the problems and future of microstates, wrote them a Constitution of 11 sections (Annex 6). Under this Constitution, full legislative and executive powers would reside in the Anguilla Council to comprise five elected and two nominated members.

The members of the first Council were appointed by the Constitution to hold office until elections were held not later than July 1968. Those so appointed were the Rev. Leonard Carty, Messrs Peter Adams, Emile Gumbs, Walter Hodge, John Hodge, John Rogers and Ronald Webster.

73. On 18 July, Mr. Adams made a request to the British delegation to the United Nations for "immediate and direct mediation by Britain". Me said that he recognised that the only procedure prescribed by the State Constitution for legal separation did not permit Anguilla to pursue it. The Anguillans had therefore been forced to take their independence unconstitutionally. BARBADOS CONFERENCE

74 The Commonwealth Governments of Barbados, Guyana, Jamaica and

Trinidad and Tobago responded to the impasse created by the events of July by appointing a Ministerial Mission to meet with the Premier of St. Kitts, Nevis and Anguilla members of his Government and a number o representatives from Angui lla to explore the possibilities of resolving the dispute by consti tutional means. They also invited the British Government to join in these discussions, and the newly appointed Minister of State, Lord Shepherd, attended the conference which was held in Barbados from 25 to 31 July. The conference reached agreement and a report duly signed

75. The main points upon which the conference reached agreement were

(a) The State Government would enact legislation replacing the Local Councils Ordinance, No. 2 of 1967, and extending the powers of the local councils, and thereafter elections would be held as speedily as possible for the Council for Anguilla;

(b) Pending the bringing into force of the legislation and the holding of elections, the following persons were recommended for sppointment as members of the Council under s. 109 of the Constitution, viz, Mr. Peter Adams, Mr. Walter Hodge, Mr. Emile Gumbs, Mr. Phillip Lloyd and Mr. Wallace Richardson;

(c) The Commonwealth Caribbean Governments would assist in recruiting a suitable person as Warden; (d) Provided that Anguilla returned to lawful government the strength of the police would remain at the

level of recent years; (e) A peace-keeping team consisting of police officers provided by the Commonwealth Caribbean Governments wpuld be stationed in Anguilla during the initial stages of the re-establishment of constitutional government and would be under the

command of a senior police officer selected by those Governments
