# TO ANGUILLA ACT, 1971- BILL INDE LAW

According to word received in Anguilla Her Majexty Queen Elizabeth 11 has given Royal Assent and the Anguilla Act, 1971 has now become law. Her Majesty made the Anguilla (Administration) Order at a meeting of the Privy Couril held on Wednesday in Buckingham Palace.

It is expected that under this Act, the Order-in-Council will be published on Tuesday, 3rd August and come into operation on Wednesday 4th August.

# NEW ANGUILLA COUNCIL TO BE SWORN IN UNDER ANGUILLA ACT, 1971, NEXT FRIDAY:

Formalities in connection with the new legal status of Anguilla under Britain and in accordance with the law of the Anguilla Act, 1971 recently passed by the House of Commons, the House of Lords and given assent by H.M. the Queen on Wednesday at a meeting of the Privy Council in London, will be observed in Anguilla next Week.

It is understood here that the British Order-in-Council will be published on Tuesday, 3rd, August and that it will come into force on Wednesday, 4th, August.

A formal meeting of the Anguilla Council for the swearing in of members and the election of a Council leader and other formal business has been called for 9.00 (Cont'd or page 2)

### COMMONIEALTH CARIBBEAN LEADERS END CONFEDENCE AND CONDEMN DRITISH ACTION IN FREEING ANGUILLA.

St. George's Grenada- Heads and representatives of eight Caribbean Governments, concluding their meeting in Grenada today, have agreed on procedures for a new political union which delegates described as the beginning of a new destiny for the region's four million people. The new agreement is to be called "The Declaration of Grenada."

The conference also considered the question of Anguilla, and deplored the uni-lateral action announced by Britain for the resumption of direct administration of the island. The conference believed that this action of the British Government called in question the status of the constituents of the Associated States and the character of the British presence in the Caribbean.

At the conference Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, St. Kitts, St. Lucia and St. Vincent were represented by their heads of governments. Trinidad & Tobago's Minister of Mealth attended and Antigua's Minister of Education & Culture was present as an observer. Barbados and Jamaica were not represented.

# THE POLITICS OF DEVELOPMENT: THE CALYPSO OF EDUCATIONAL MODIFICATION.

Next to the family the school plays a very important role in forming the citizen, As I have pointed out previously man is shaped by his environment and because the school is one of the primary agents of this socialization or shaping process we must take a closer look at its processes and functions if we are taking development seriously.

There are many things about our educational system which should make us proud. Yet we must not come to the conclusion that it needs no modification. Nor should we think that the U.S. system or any other system of education serves as a pattern for us to imitate mainly because of different goals and limited funds for educational facilities. Too often students who study abroad are so illusioned by those countries "advancement" that they fail to see basic courses of problems in those societies. They rush back to the islands and say "this is the way to do it, because this is the way it is done in the U.S. or Britain," without taking environmental factors into consideration. In my studies in criminology, I have found many direct and indirect relationships between crime and the educational system, between injustice and the educational system in the United States, In fact America suffers greatly and will continue to do so if there is no radical reform. Now people are getting up from dreaming and the winds of change are sweeping across this country gradually destroying its popular myths.

We cannot look to any frontier now but Anguilla, We must make the best of what we have. "We do not want to become a nation of bus boys." What are the alternatives? What are our goals? Where are we going and how are we going to get there? We have to decide now.

Our greatest natural resource is human beings. "The quality of our population is the ultimate determinant of development." The time is here when we have to face the problems and not run away to a foreign country.

The educational system by being to some extent antiquated impedes development because it does not allow the student to use his ability to be a creative thinker or action oriented. The student enters the classroom to be disciplined rather than to search for solutions to problems in his society. The teachers, who are usually products of the same system, carry on faithfully, Inocently, they become the new infallible Gods whose duty it is to keep students in order, making sure that they understand what they are saying but rarely, if ever, giving the student the chance to discuss. In fact, the best student is the one who accepts theories without question. It is a matter of digesting and regurgitating a bunch of meaningless facts and not daring to disagree or ask why such irrelevant nonesense is being learnt. (However, we must not conclude that the whole thing is no good because the students

Looking at the Anguillan move for independence from St, Kitts we see that the majority of active participants were mainly those who had been rejected by the system or who had voluntarily rejected the rigidity of our schools or thosewho had travelled abroad. From this along with many other examples, we see that the present educational system perpetuates stagnation of talent, encourages blind subjectivity and sets the stage for political, cultural and economical domination by foreign interests Cont'd on page 8.

#### EDITORIAL:

Many West Indian people and certain Governments are probably smazed at the efforts of the participants of the "Grenada Declaration." To see its objections come to pass would be a welcomed sight for all, so will Britain, the U.S. and Canada who have been encouraging

Caribbean integration.

We in Anguilla look at the "Grenada Declaration" as a mean hope to step Britain passing legislation for the direct Administration of Anguilla. (Although Britain would welcome Caribbean integration her role in Anguilla is only democratic in we ping with the wishes of the peop of Anguilla who have a fundamental right to choose the form of Government they desire over any constitutional arrangements made of any body of men).

The history of the West Indies Fed tion must have revealed itself in minds of those attending aference. It was not until yea: after the breaking up of the Federation that the leaders in the region found out that the best way of achieving integration was by economic means, so CARIFTA was formed but it was not long before discontent among the smaller islands with CARIFTA and threats of withdrawal from the Association occured. Some of those leaders are the ones who attended the Grenada conference seeking "Political Union". It seems unbelievable that they are sincere in their efforts and for this reason we

believe that other Caribbean Governments who did not take part in the conference or who were only observers are waiting to see the sinceríty of these men.

We are sure Caribbean Unity would be welcomed by Anguilla too, but the days of holding the apron string of St. Kitts are gone and any possible solutions for integration would have to satisfy the people of Anguilla, just as they would have to satisfy the people of the other big and smaller islands.

For those who condemned Britain for her action in Anguilla we say to them: "Don't blame Britain, she did not force herself on Anguilla. This was done by the invitation of the Anguillans themselves and the rightful ones to blame are the Anguillans if you have to blame some one." We are now grown-ups and can take the responsibility ourselves. We chose Britain because we feel that Britain is in a far better position to look after our interest than St. Kitts, who is unable to look after herself.

The mere fact that Britain has met the wishes of Anguilla above criticism shows that true democracy still exists in England, while it only appears to exist in most of the Caribbean islands.

#### OPPOSITION LEADER IN ST. VINCENT IN FAVOUR OF BRITISH ACTION IN ANGUILLA .:

Mr. E. T. Joshua, leader of the opposition Party in St, Vincent's Parliament, has come out strongly in favour of the British Government taking Anguilla under

its Colonial Wing

Addressing a public meeting, Mr. Joshua said: "No one who is reasonable would wonder that the British Government has come to the aid of a small neglected territory as Anguilla and has braved the stigma of wanting to keep colonies still,"

"Once the people of Anguilla have decided for themselves no West Indian Island has the right to superimpose its will on the people of Anguilla. The people of Anguilla alone Lave tasted the bitter yoke of ill-treatment and decided that it were better being under Whitehall Colonialism than that of St. Kitts."

Referring to the Ministers of the Associated States as neo-colonialist rulers in the form of heads of Government, he said: "In the Statehood territories, the people are treated incomparably worse than anything experienced under what is popularly called in these parts

the "Colonial Yoke."

Mr. Joshua, 64, Chief Minister of St. Vincent from 1960 to 67, worked hard towards a West Indies Federation but saw it come to naught accordingly takes Guyana and Trinidad to task on their stand to keep Anguilla tied to St. Kitts with

talk of integration.

He said: "Surprisingly, the Premier of Guyana whose country would have nothing to do with a federation of the West Indies and saw that federation fail for want of popular support in the territories, comes forward talking about convening a conference to hold down Anguilla and to foil the United

decision of the people.

"Dr. Williams of Trinidad on whom Prime Minister Forbes Burnham is calling upon to help shackle Anguill has his hands filled with the creation of his one party state and his absolute rule; it was Dr. Williams himself who broke up the West Indies Federation by his peculiar system of mathematics - 'One from ten leaves nought' - and abandoned us to our fate,"

Mr. Joshua associated himself with the British Government's view that it is wrong for any country to force another under the yoke of a

country it does not want.

Meanwhile Dominica's Opposition Party, the "Freedom Party" cabled Mr. Ronald Webster in Anguilla, rejoicing with them that the basic human rights of the people of Anguilla have prevailed over constitutional niceties and figments. The Party also cabled the British Representative to the Associated States in St. Lucia complimenting Britain on the stand and final issue in Anguilla crisis saying happiness and welfare of Thousands Anguillans infinitely more important than any constitutional nicety or figment,

A public report from St. Lucia where Commonwealth Caribbean leaders are in conference said the leaders decided before the meeting not to

discuss Anguilla.
