### ALD TAMES NOT ALLOWED TO DO BUCKERS IN ST. WARTEN:

Valley Air Service and Anguilla Airways, have been instructed not to do business in or out of St. Maarten. The orders we are told, comes from the Airport Authorities in St. Maarten as a result of new regulations which came into effect in St. Maarten on May 24th, 1971.

We have learnt that in retaliation to the position taken by the St. Maarten Authorities, Windward Island Airways have been barred from operating in or out of "aliblake Airport in Anguilla," Her Majesty's Commissioner, until the matter is settled.

It is understood that the Authorities in St, Maarten and Anguilla are in contact with each other and it is hoped that flights will be resumed shortly.

Meanwhile, those with occasion to travel to St. Maarten may wish to use the ferries between Blowing Point and Marigot, St. Maarten. Valley Air Service and Anguilla Airways' flights to other points are not affected.

### MIGNILLA COUNCIL MAKES PLANS FOR OPENING COURTS AND POLICE FORCE.

The Anguilla Council met today (Tuesday) in the Court House under the Chairmanship of H.M. Commissioner. The meeting opened in public session with a prayer and immediately after Mr. Wallace Rey took and subscribed the oaths of allegiance and office before H.M. Commissioner; as prescribed by the Anguilla Order-in-Council.

The Council then adjourned and resumed their routine executive session to consider a number of matters of current concern. Among the more important of these were various legal matters concerning the opening of the Courts in Anguilla and, in addition, various preliminary questions relating to the setting up of an Anguilla Police Force.

According to an announcement from H.M. Commissioner's Office, applications are now invited from persons wishing to join the Anguilla Police Force which is to be established. Applicats should be between 18 and 35 years of age, weighing not less than 135 pounds and no less than five feet eight inches in height.

All candidates will be required to undertake a medical and educational examination. Applicants must be Anguillan born or having at least one parent born in Anguilla.

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#### COLLISSIONER'S OFFICE ISSUES ISTRUCTIONS CIVILIAN POPULATION OF ANGUILLA.

The period during which hurricanes are likely to occur, is from August to October. H.M. Commissioner's Office has issued a printed tions for the Civilian population

Arrangements have been made for Radio Anguilla to broadcast reports of any hurricane in the Caribbean area. In the event of a hurricane Anguillans will be advised to take precautions at this time of year. As a reminder:

Make a thorough chech-up of all shutters, hooks and latches. See that corrugated iron roofing is properly fastened. Keep nails, hammers, wire, rope and pliers handy. Keep a supply of timber for boarding up. Keep a torch, hurricane Anguilla Valley Secondary school. lamp and candles. Be ready to lay in a stock of food and water. Warnings of an approaching storm will be notified to the public by the following methods:

(A) Broadcasts by Radio Anguilla. (B) Police patrols with public

address equipment.

(C) Warning flags will be flown in the harbours at Island Harbour, Blowing Point, Road Bay, Forest Bay, and Meads Bay, at Wallbuilding.

The following system of warning will operate:

(a) First Warning - Tropical disturbance in area. Hurricane possible. General Precautions to be completed. ONE RED and BLACK flag will be flown.

(b) Second Warning - Hurricane probable. Two RED and BLACK flags will be flown.

(c) Third Warning - Hurricane imminent. RED flag only will be flown.

#### EDITORIAL

The controversy about the Air plane service between Anguilla and St. Maarten is very distressing.

We understand that this situation has come about because of route flights between Dutch and American Airlines, Consequently Anguitlan Air-Taxis (American registered) are affected.

Anguilla with Dutch and French
St. Maarten has always had friendly
relations and it would be very
unfortunate for the Air planes
situation to cause strife between
us. As a result of Valley Air
Service and Anguilla Airways not
being allowed to do business in
St. Maarten, Windward Islands
Airways of St. Maarten has been
temporarily stopped from making
flights to Anguilla until the
matter is cleared up.

Very rightly we agree with the action taken for this will get both anguilla and St. Maarten to reach some agreement whereby all three Air Services could operate.

We understand that Windward Islands flights from Anguilla to St. Maarten on Thursday morning was remporarily prevented from taking off by a group of taxi drivers, in protest of the action taken by the Dutch. While we do not agree with the blocking of the plane we totally agree that the taxi drivers were right in preventing them taking passengers. For the benefit of all concerned we hope that the British Government and the Dutch Government will negotiate an agreement and that our good relations will continue.

#### MR. JEREMIAH GEMES EXPLAINS:

On Thursday morning, August 19th 1971, a Windward Islands Aircraft was prevented by a group of Taxi drivers, from leaving Wallblake Airport with passengers. Whatever their reason may have been, it was wrong. The British Government has accepted responsibility for law and order in Anguilla. It was up to the Commissioner, Mr. Watson, to act, not for mob rule to take over.

Later that afternoon, after my return from St. Martin, I spoke to Mr. Ronald Webster about the incident and was horrified when he told me that he approved the action of the taxi drivers. The Commissioner however, told me that he had taken steps to see that this does not happe again and deplored the action of the taxi drivers.

Fellow Anguillans you have been given misinformation on the reason why Anguilla Airways and Valley Air Service are not flying to St. Martin. I have written a letter asking that an official of the Civil Aviation Authority come as my guest to Anguilla and tell you first hand the real problem.

The Anguilla Council and the people have been kept in the dark too long and I will try to assist in seeing


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#### A LETTER TO YOUNG MIGUILLAIS:

#### PART 11

We must ask questions; we must find tentative answers. Never has the human race been forced to question his existence on this "Spaceship Earth" - to borrow a phrase from one of America's greatest social scientists. Now the very survival of the human race depends on man's ability to clean

up his dirty work. As I have pointed out previously, we have been going through a crisis of intelectual poverty. Education has, and is being used to a large extent for selfish gains - business asset. Will it have to take severe famines dust storms etc for man to come to the realization that even though he has some control over the environment he does not exist apart from it? When will we wake up? Some of us have been very fortunate to have a good biology and geography teacher. You have learnt as well as I have, I am not a botanist nor am I involved in wildlife conservation studies. My friends, the time is here when doctor, lawyer, politician or dentist - whatever you may be cannot ignore the need for better management of natural resources, We are all parts of a whole which to a large extent is beyond our comprehension. What are we - the youth of Anguilla - doing for the welfare of the island? Are we all trying to find a job that will not get our hands dirty? If that is the case, think it over seriously. No matter what we are we have to take time out to consider such things and do something about them. If I were to stick in my little area I wouldn't be writing now. I would be pack-

ing my bags to catch the bus or train to Omaha in two days to do a study in criminology.

# TEXT OF THE AUGUSTAL (APPLIESTDATION) OTHER 1071. (Cont'd from page 5)

Citation, commencement, revocation and termination
1.-(1) This Order may be cited as the Anguilla (Administration) Order 1971.
(2) This Order shall come into operation on 4th August 1971, and the Anguilla (Temporary Provision) Order 1969 (b) is revoked with effect from

that date.
(3) This Order shall cease to have effect on such date as a Secretary of State may by order appoint.

#### Interpretation

#### 2.- (1) In this Order-

"the Commissioner" means such person as Her Majesty may appoint by instrument under Her Sign Manual and Signet to be Her Majesty's Commissioner in Anguilla for the purposes of this Order and includes any person appointed by Her Majesty by instructions given through a Secretary of State to act in that office and, to the extent to which a deputy appointed under section 3 of this Order is authorised to act, that deputy;

"the Constitution" means the Constitution of the Associated State (c) and "the Courts Order" means the West Indies Associated States Supreme Court Order 1967 (d)
