## FIR. W.R. WATKINS APPOINTED AS MAGISTRATE - COURTS TO OPEN EARLY SEPT.

H.M. Commissioner, Mr. Arthur Watson after consultation with the Anguilla Council, has appointed Mr. W.R. Watkins as Magistrate for Anguilla.

ment reads: "In exercise of the powers vested in me by Section 16 (1) of the Anguilla Administration Order, 1971. I hereby appoint William Rutter Watkins to exercise within Anguilla, and powers, duties and jurisdiction conferred upon any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace by any Law for the time being Commissioner on Winair flights. in force in Anguilla."

The new Anguilla Magistrate formally opened the Magistrate's Court on Friday, 27th August and will hold sittings from September. Mr. Watkins who was on the island for about two years has been legal adviser to H.M.Commissioner.

## MAN CHARGED WITH UNLAWFULLY WOUNDING - BAIL GRANTED

Leslie Webster of Mount Fortune was charged with unlawfully wounding one Lotis Hodge of Welches, with a pair of domestic scissors, contrary to section 19 of the Offences Against Persons Act, Chapter 56 of the Laws, in the Anguilla Magistrate's Court at 9 o'clock on Friday Morning.

# 133 CANDIDATES FOR CONFIRMATION IN ANGUILLA OVER THE WEEKEND:

The Rt. Rev. Orland' Lindsay, B.D., Bishop of the Anglican Diocese subject of the latest issue of new of which Anguilla is part, will arrive on the island on Saturday morning for the weekend.

It is expected that the total of 193 candidates will take part in the services of confirmation, which are being conducted by the visiting Bishop. These services will be the first confirmations in over two years in Apguilla.

It is expected that Bishop Lindsay will preside for the A.Y.P.A. service at St. Mary's Churca at 4,30 on Sunday afternoon.

The visiting Bishop expects to return to Antigua on Monday.

# HIGHLY ATTRACTIVE NEW ISSUE OF STAMPS AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC ON MONDAY.

"Battles of the West Indies" is the Anguillan Stamps which will go on sale at the Central Post Office, Administration Building on Monday morning.

The stamps are in five denominations 10¢,15¢,25¢,40¢, and 50¢ and are printed in pentad form with the five denominations horizontal, showing in panarama array more than a score of old 17th and 18th century Battle ships. The ships depicted are of the Royal Navy including H.M.S. Formidable H.M.S. Namur, H.M.S. St. Alban's, H.M.S. Duke and others. The scene illustrates a West Indies naval battle when the British fleet under Admiral Benbow, Admiral Rodney and Admiral Nelson defeated the French in the "Battle of the Saints".

The new Anguilla stamps which are extremely attractive can be purchased for \$1.40 per set and \$1,50 for first Day Covers,

The stamps are printed by John Lister Ltd., in London for the Anguilla postal services.

## AIR SERVICE PROBLEM NOT QUITE SETTLED.

The Air Service between St. Maarten and Anguilla is still not quite settled. Valley Air Service has been granted permission to t take passengers and cargo into St. Maarten but cannot take any out, while Anguilla Airways has been granted temporary permission to make two flights to St. Maarten daily shuffling passengers in and out.

Capt. Clayton Lloyd of V.A.S. has been invited to Curacao to meet the Aviation Authorities on the matter, and left for Curacao on Thursday.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR by Jeremiah

The Anguilla Airways has been granted temporary landing rights at Juliana Airport in St. Maarten until August 31st, 1971.

The Commissioner can secure permanent landing rights for the Anguilla Airways if he so desires. I will await the outcome of his negotiations with the Civil Aviation Authorities before I make further comment of this subject.

There are a few points of information however, which should be made clear to the Anguillan public. 1. Peter J. McClees an American tourist in Anguilla on Nov. 2nd, physically took over the ownership of Anguilla Airways and a piece of land at WallBlake Airport which was given to Jeremiah Gumbs for the purpose of building an aeroplane hangar.

The F.A.A. in San Juan Puerto Rico will verify this and Walter Rey at Wall Blake Anguilla,

On Dec. 8th 1966 Peter J. McClees called my home in the U.S. and said that he was legally wrong for covering Clayton Lloyd into signing the Air-Taxi Licence of Anguilla Airways which was owned by Jeremiah Gumbs, over in his name, and was returning it to the F.A.A. and applying for an Air-Taxi licence as Valley Air Service.

I had given Clayton Lloyd the power of attorney to sign my name.

On Jan. 20 1967 Peter J. McClees paid me for 171 hours which he had operated as Anguilla Airways and Clayton Lloyd paid me for damages to the Aircraft which he had abandoned in Puerto Rico and for the removal of life saving equipment which he had taken from the aircraft to put on the aircraft which was bought partly from money which was made by Anguilla Airways the balance being paid by Peter J. McClees. Peter J. McClees was now the owner of Valley Air Service and had destroyed the character of an Anguillan youth forever. I would like to leave you with a quotation from Mahatma Ghandi. # THE ANGUILLA (ADMINISTRATION) ORDER 1971, (Continued from last week)

(2) The Interpretation Act 1889 (e) shall apply, with the necessary adaptations, for the purpose of interpreting this Order and otherwise in relation thereto as it applie for the purpose of interpreting and in relation to Acts of the U United Kingdom Parliament.

### Commissioner's Deputy

3.- (1) Whenever the Commissioner (a) has the occasion to be absent from Anguilla for a period that he

(b) is suffering from an illness that he has reason to believe will be of short duration

appoint any person in Anguilla to be his Deputy during such absence or illness and in that capacity to perform on his behalf such of the functions of the office of Commissioner as may be specified in the writing.

(2) The powers and authority of the Commissioner shall not be abridges, altered or in any way affected by the appointment of a deputy under this section, and a deputy shall conform to and observe ioner may from time to time address to him:

appointment may be revoked at any time by Her Majesty by instructions given through a Secretary of State or by the Commissioner.

Functions of the Commissioner

4.-(1) The Commissioner shall have such powers and other functions as may be conferred upon him by this Order or by or under any other law for the time being in force in Anguilla.

(2) Her Majesty may by instructions given to the Commissioner through a Secretary of State confer upon the Commissioner powers and other functions additional to those conferred upon him by this Order or by or under any other law; and, unless it is otherwise provided therein, any such instructions shall have the force of law and in that case shall be published in Anguilla in such manner as the Commissioner may direct. (3) In the exercise of the functions conferred tupon him by this Orderhor by or under any other claw the commissioner shall act in accordancer with such instructions as may from fime foutime be given to himrby Her Majesty through a Secretary of State, (4) The question whether the Commissioner has complied with any such instructions as to the exercise of any of his functions shall not be enquired into any court of law.

Power to make Ordinances

5.-(1) The Commissioner, acting after consultation with the Anguilla Council, may by ordinance make provision for securing and maintaining public as afety and public order in Anguilla and generally for securing and maintaining good government within Anguilla,

(2) Any ordinance made under this section shall be published in Anguilla in such a manner as the Commioner may direct, (TO BE CONT'D)
