LAST SOLDIER LEAVES A GUILLA AS ROYAL ENGINEERS DEPART ON WEDNESDAY AFTER THO AND A HALF YEARS.

On Wednesday afternnon, two R.A.F. Hercules aircraft flew from Wallblake Airport carrying with it the 30 remaining members of the Royal Engineers contingent on Anguilla, The departing British Engineers were headed by Major L.J. Kennedy, R.E., whose 51 Field Squadron has been on the island since last mid-March.

His contingent was the last of the NEW ISLAND HARBOUR PRIMARY SCHOOL half yearly companies of the Royal Engineers who first landed in Anguilla on March 19th, 1969, The huge aircraft circled the island in salute to the people of Anguilla before turning to Antigua.

During their 30 months on the island their work had been peaceful and many improvements for Anguilla such as new services, buildings and roads are evidence of their sojourn on the island

The departing Engineers were seen off at the airstrip by hundreds of Anguillans which included H.M. Commissioner and members of his staff, Mr. Ronald Webster, Leader of the Anguilla Council, members of the Anguilla Council and many others, all present to bid farewell to the soldiers who came in peace and remained as friends.

The Royal Engineers over nighted in Antigua before flying on to the United Kingdom.

FORMALLY OPENED BY H.M. COMMISSIONER

More than 300 Anguillans turned out at 9.0'clock on Wednesday morning to take part in the impressive ceremonies attending the formal opening of the Island School, which was officially turned over to the Anguilla Education Department on this occasion

The school declared opened by H.M. Commissioner, Mr. Arthur Watson and the keys were handed over formally to the new Head Master, Mr. Vivien Vanterpool by Major L.J. Kennedy, R.E. Commander, Force Anguilla on behalf of all the Royal Engineers who had been concerned with the building of the new school

Chairman for the opening ceremonies was Mr Kenneth Hazell, Chairman of the Education Committee, of the Anguilla Council, who introduced $H_{\circ}M_{\circ}$ Commissioner, Mr $_{\circ}$ Arthur Watson. The Commissioner referred to the three Royal Engineers contingents who had been engaged in the construction of the school and paid tribute to contributions made by the Public Works Department. class rooms, possibly in 1972 and referred to the relief of over crowding in theEast End school which will result from the operation of the New School. Mr.Watson thanked all those concerned with the new school on declaring it open and extended wishes for success to all teachers and students who would benefit from it

Mr Ronald Webster, Leader of the Anguilla Council expressed his official gratitude to all the Royal Engineers for their work on the island over the past thirty months. He stated that the Engineers had worked well with the people and declared that if any could come back for a visit they would be received with open arms. He extended his warmest good wishes to all concerned.

Major Keneddy mention the dual function of the Royal Engineers as both soldiers and constructive workmen. He handed over the keys to Head Master Mr. Vivien Vanterpool. He stated that all his men were leaving the island with regret of having found so much friendship on Anguilla.

The New Head Madter spoke of the historic occasion, which had originally been mentioned, as far back as 1941. He hoped to organise an active Parent Teachers Association for the Island Harbour School and thanked all parents for their interest and help.

Mrs.Thelma Hunte, of Island Harbour, spoke on behalf of the parents and referred to the saving of time and effort which would effected by the Island Harbour School for students in the district.

The new school will accommodate 205 students to begin with. The impressive ceremonies ended with the singing of the Doxology and "God Save The Queen", after which refreshments were served and the visitors were taken on a tour of the building. The opening ceremonies were also attended by members of the Anguilla Council and members of the Anguilla Education Committee.

BRITISH FRIGATE H.M.S. TARTAR SPENT DAY IN AUGUILLA.

The British Frigate H.M.S.Tartar arrived at Road Bay at about 8 o' clock on Thursday morning for a one day courtesy visit to Anguilla. The ship's officers were met on arrival by the Deputy Commissioner Mr. Kenneth Jones, who accompanied the Commanding Officer to visit H.M. Commissioner, Mr. Arthur Watson at his office at South Hill.

The Captain of H.M.S. Tartar is Commander Robert JamesNorthard,R.N., who also paid a courtesy call on Mr.Roaald Webster, Leader of the Anguilla Council, and also met Chief Inspector, David Helm, Commander of the A.P.U.

Commander Northard, originally of Hull, Yorkshire, has served on a number of Royal Navy Ships including the aircraft carriers, HMS Arc Royal and H M S Hermes Prior to his present command Captain Northard commanded 764 Naval air squadrons at the Royal Navy Air Station Lossimouth, and was then designated as the Commanding Officer of the Royal Navy Squadron before being selected for promotion to Commander in June 1970. He took command of HMS Tattar in Singapore in December of last year, H.M.S. Tartar is a general purpose frigate of the Tribal Class. Its length is 360 feet with a beam of 42 feet and a replacement of 3000 tons. HMS Tartar is fitted with the latest radar equipment and defence weapons including two 4.5 inch guns and is equiped with a Wasp anti submarine helicopter which can fire homing torpedoes and depth charges Following (con't on page 3)

TALK ON RADIO ANGUILLA BY MAJOR L.J. KENNEDY RE, FORCE ANGUILLA.

After two and a half years the time has come for the Royal Engineers to leave Anguilla. You must have come so used to seeing us around that you might have thought we were here for ever It is of course true that there is a great deal that we could still do here but I am sure you will realise that there are other places hope this had been shown great other countries where our work is required. BRITISH FRIGATE HMS TARTAR VISITS March. I don't wish to chronicle all they have done this evening. You can see their work with your own eyes the roads, the schools, the library, the electrical works, the North Hill pipe line and many other works are visible to you as go about your daily business.

For our part we were a Force that was reduced in size and we concentrated our main efforts on training the Public Works Department to carry on when we have gone. This I hope we have done. There are now trained road gangs in the Department and their skills should allow the development work, so sorely needed, to continue. Our other main task has been the disposal of the vehicles, plant and equipmentthat had accumulated here during the previous two years. Some we transfered to PWD, some we sold to local buyers and some we sent back to Britain. I hope that the equipment that remains on the island will help those who bought it. It has been heartening to see so much of this equipment in use daily. I hope that the contribution our soldiers have made to the island is more than just a material one. I hope that by our participation in many island activities we have demonstrated our friendship. We like to think that our soldiers are good ambassadorsfor Britain and I friendship by you and I would like you to know how much we appreciate it.

We have felt very welcome here and we have found on this beautiful little island people who are cheerful, honest and very friendly. The wonderful beaches and clear sea are easy to appreciate but when one lives in a place for six months and gets to know the people well there is so much more to like about Anguilla. There is a tranquility about this island that I remember 33 Field Squadron, 48 Field for a short while - long may this tranquility continue.

EDITORIAL:

PRICE CONTROL ?

Shall the Government of Anguilla establish a "Price Control Board" ? This is a gesture that many people are asking. And it seems to be many arguments for it. will be against it. Their reason, one can very well understand,

It is a fact though, that the sost of living on the island is tremendously high Merchants receive in some cases as much as 50 % discount on certain whole sale goods, depending on the amount of the order, We are aware of the shipping problems to the island and maybe this can account for some of the high prices, but then should not the merchants organise themselves so that they can warrant a ship calling at our ports ? (The Atlantic Lines have discontinued calling here).

On the other hand, there are cases when some merchants charge too high a profit. The Customs Dept. have records of the cost of goods, the shipping and landing charges, for it is on this cost that the Custom Duties are paid with a reasonable profit, it would be a greater turn over in business and more commerce on the island. As it is, the people are forced to buy less. We think there is more arguments in favour of a price control, than against.

UR. LESLIE MEBSTER, SENTENCED, TO THREE MONTHS FOR MALICIOUS MOUNDING this week.

Leslie Webster of Mount Fortune was sentenced to three months in gaol with hard labour when he pleaded guilty to unlawfully and maliciously wounding Lotis Hodge guilty before Magistrate Watkins tic sissors on August 3rd.

The accused entered a plea of guilty before Anguilla Magistrate, $Mr_{\bullet}W_{\circ}R_{\bullet}Watkins$ at session of the Court on Monday morning Sept 13th, The accused had been remanded on bail of \$200,00 since the case first came before the Magistrate on August 27th. According to the prosecution statement, Leslie Webster, had been drinking, went to the house of Lotis Hodge and during an argument the accused stabbed the woman four times in the left chest.
