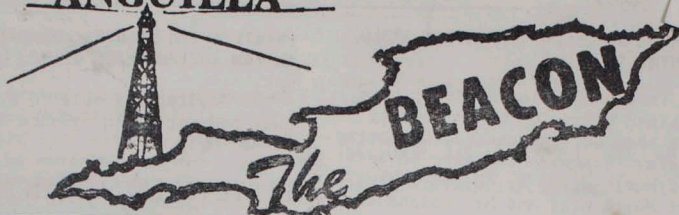

RECRUITS SELECTED AS BASIS FOR NEW ANGUILLA POLICE FORCE:

Thirteen Anguillans have been offered appointments as recruits for the new Anguilla Police Force, and these 13, selected out of 26 applications, by the public Service Commission, with the present four members will bring the strength of the local police force to 17 when it is established.

The new recruits will be trained by Sergeant Frank Tabor of the Metropolitan Police who have recently arrived on the island from the world-famous police training school at Hendon, England to give instruction to the Anguillan Force along lines of courtesy and service to the public which has long been the reputation of the Metropolitan police in London. The training course which will begin on Monday, 4th, October, will be formally opened at the Police Club by H.M. Commissioner, Mr. Arthur Watson, and will be under the general direction of Chief Inspector James Bailey, and Mr. W.A. Crennell, Police Adviser to H.M. Commissioner's Office.

The training programme for the Anguilla Police Force will include criminal Law, police procedure, First Aid, life-saving, physical training and foot drill.

MAYOR OF ST. BARTHS - DIVING IN WRECK OFF SCRUB ISLAND.

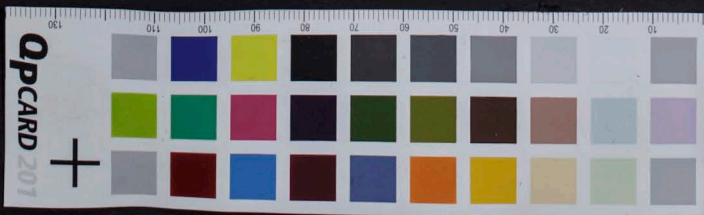
On Thursday afternoon police boarded the M/V Angle off Scrub Island and warned the owner Mr. Remy de Haenen the Mayor of St. Barths not to dive into the wreck again without seeking permission.

The wreck lying about ten yards off Graften point on Scrub Island is believed to be over 200 years old. Fishermen from Anguilla have taken many pounds of brass ware in the area over the past years. One fisherman, Mr. David Webster of Island Harbour stated that there are a number of canons with two huge anchors embedded into the coral.

On Wednesday afternoon the M/V Angle was seen in the area for the second time in a year. Thursday when the boat returned the police were notified and on boarding the police said, Mr. de Haenen who was on board said he was taking pictures to make a film. Divers said that explosives were used to remove the coral and some of the canons were blown out.

The police said that Mr. de Haenen was asked to leave and not to return without permission from the authorities.

Two of the Students, Miss Anne Edwards and Mr. Roland Kentish will be going to the Cave Hill Campus of the U.W.I. in Barbados, and the third Mr. David Carty is scheduled to attend the Mona University near Kingston, Jamaica.

Miss Edwards will be taking her B.A. Degree course at U.W.I. during which, for the next several years, she will be majoring in Economics.

Mr. Roland Kentish has been accepted by the Faculty of Natural Sciences, on the completion of his first year's work, Mr. Kentish plans to transfer to the Mona University to read Medicine.

Mr. David Carty, who will be going direct to Mona Campus, will be working towards his Social Science Degree.

ROAD ACCIDENT- SCOUT COMMISSIONER'S CAR BADLY DAMAGED.

A road Accident occurred shortly after 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon on the airport road in front of the home of Mr. T.R. Lake, Commissioner for Scouts in Anguilla. No one was injured.

Mr. Lake was driving his Morris Oxford Sedan, A 118, out of his driveway and a Chevrolet Acadian, A 547 owned by Kenzie Lake of Stoney Ground and driven by Leroy Gumbs also of Stoney ground was proceeding from the direction of the Mahogany Tree. The Acadian collided with the right front fender of Mr. Lake's Car causing it to turn striking the wall

resulting in considerable damage to the entire front of Mr. Lake's car.

The Acadian was able to drive away however, with crushed left fender only.

NEW NAME FOR BARCLAYS BANK D.C.O.

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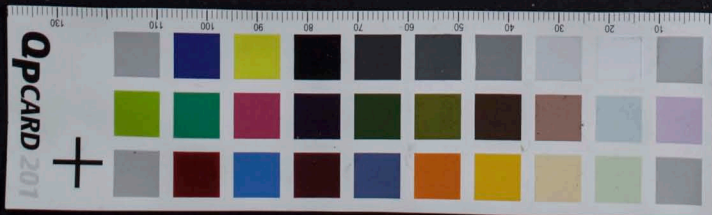

Mr. Adrian Hazel, Headmaster of the Road School South Hill, left Anguilla last weekend for England where he will take up his studies at the University of Birmingham, as the result of being awarded a year's scholarship for a special course for headteachers and administration at the School of Education in Birmingham.

The course opens on September 28th and was made possible by arrangements with the British Development Division for the Caribbean through H.M. Commissioner's Office in Anguilla.

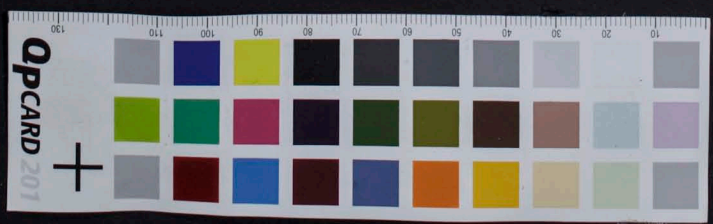

EDITORIAL:

The logical step following the return of Anguilla to legal status has been the plans to organise and train an Anguilla Police force, and according to the news this project is already well under way. Anguilla is to have its own police force of 17 men- all Anguillans.

After four months intensive training under Hendon police training instructors Sgt. Frank Wernham and Sgt. Peter Tabor the Anguilla Police Force will be graduated at the end of January and will take over the enforcement of law and order on this island.

We are grateful to the highly expert specialists from the Metropolitan Police in London who have come all this way to train our police force along the lines of courtesy and service to the public, which is the enviable reputation held by the Metropolitan Police, and for which it is world famous.

Every state, no matter how peaceful and law-abiding, needs an honest, intelligent, and upright force of men (and women) to whom the public can turn for polite and helpful assistance in case of trouble or emergency. We commend the Anguilla Council and the A.P.U. through H.M. Commissioner's Office for the quick action in organising the training of the Anguilla Police Force. It is now up to the men to take full advantage of their training to make an efficient police force.

OFFICIAL OF BANK OF ENGLAND HERE FOR DISCUSSIONS.

Mr. Lusty left the island on Thursday morning.

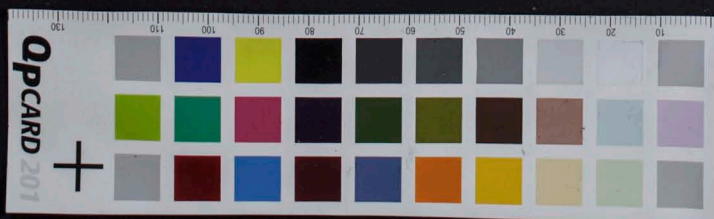
THIEVES BREAK INTO WALL BLAKE TERMINAL:

According to a police report, the Wall Blake Air Terminal Building was broken into by a person or persons unknown, sometime after 5.30 p.m. on Tuesday, 28th September. Entry into the building was made through one of the western windows from which the wooden panes had been removed.

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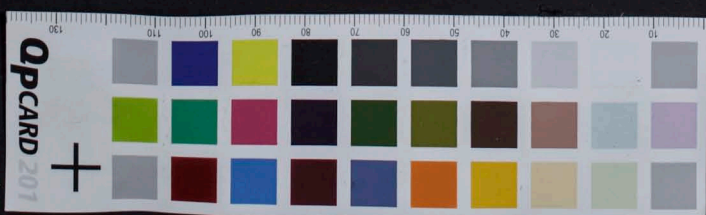

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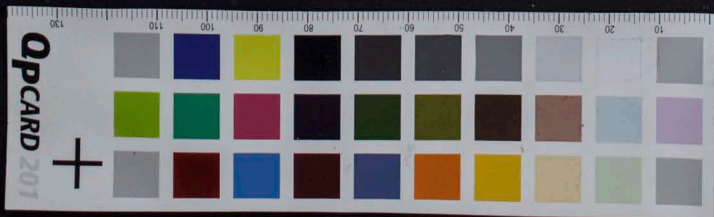

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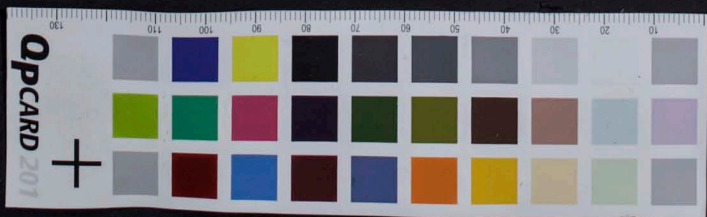
ANGUILLA RAINFALL FOR SEPTEMBER
 WAS LESS THAN THAT OF 1970

The rainfall for the first
 few days of September was quite
 encouraging, but unfortunately this
 pattern did not continue, and the
 greater part of the month was
 comparatively dry.

However, the Agricultural Depart-
 ment in the Valley recorded 2.41
 inches of rain which was well
 below the 3.38 inches which fell
 there in September of 1970.

Meanwhile, over at Little Dicks
 2.64 inches fell this September -
 about half an inch less than the
 3.17 inches recorded there during
 the same month 1970.

The total precipitations at the
 Agricultural Department for January
 to September 1971 is 25.25 inches
 as against 33.38 inches for that
 period last year.

(b) If on any question the votes of the elected members are equally divided, the Commissioner may give a casting vote.

(7) The Commissioner, acting after consultation with the Council, may make rules regulating the procedure of the Council and the orderly conduct of its proceedings.

consultation with council

14.-(1) Subject to the provisions of this section, the Commissioner shall act in co-operation with the Anguilla Council and accordingly shall consult with the Council in the formulation of policy and in the exercise of the powers vested in him by any law other than this Order.

(2) The Commissioner shall not be obliged to consult with the Council in the exercise of any power conferred upon him by any law other than this Order that he is empowered or directed by that or any other law to exercise without consulting the Council.

(3) The Commissioner shall not be obliged by subsection (1) of this section to consult with the Council in any case in which his judgement

(a) the matters to be decided are too unimportant to require consultation with the Council thereon;

(b) such consultation would involve material prejudice to Her Majesty's service; or

(c) the matters to be decided are too urgent to admit of such consultation by the time within which it may be time for him to act.

Provided that in any case falling within paragraph (c) the Commissioner shall report the action he has taken to the Council at the first convenient opportunity.

(4) In every case in which the

Commissioner is required by section 5(1) T(2) or 13(7) of this Order

The University of London "O" level tests resulted in pass with a distinction in Biology for Rodney Rey, who also had a pass in Mathematics. Eleven other students secured Passes in Geography, Biology, French & Mathematics and these included: Valdama Brooks, Marcia Gumbs, Norma Hodge, Franklin Hughes, Albert Lake, Crefton Niles, Cossilda O'Loughlin, Fabian Proctor, Orris Proctor, Lucia Richardson & Claudel Romney.

In the Cambridge "O" level examinations, the results for Anguilla students gave a Distinction in English to Oral Bynoe who also secured a Pass in History.

Claudiel Romney took passes in five subjects and four passes were secured by Gloria Banks, Cossilda O'Loughlin Lucia Richardson, & Rosemary Richardson. Passes in three were awarded to Carmen Fahie, Marcia Gumbs, Margaret U.I. Hodge, Ophelia Hodge, Maria Lake C. Banks and P. Hunte.

Franklyn Hughes passed in History.

Cambridge "A" level results gave passes in History and Economics to Wendell Proctor, a Pass in English to Rhoda Hodge and a Pass in Economics to Errol Brooks.
